Embark on a 14-night Namibian safari starting centrally in Windhoek at The Olive Exclusive Hotel, known for its regionally themed suites and sleek, modern décor. Discover Sossusvlei's iconic red sand dunes at Wilderness Little Kulala, offering luxury desert suites with private amenities and rooftop stargazing. Explore Twyfelfontein's rock art at Wilderness Damaraland Camp before moving to Wilderness Desert Rhino Camp, renowned for rare desert-adapted black rhinos and unique wildlife. Witness the diverse wildlife along the Hoanib River at Wilderness Hoanib Skeleton Coast Camp, home to large herds of elephants and lion on the hunt.

Conclude your journey at Anderson's on Ongava in the Ongava Private Game Reserve, known for its conservation efforts and luxurious guest accommodations, offering unique wildlife experiences.



Itinerary

The Olive Exclusive Hotel, Windhoek - 1 Night

Situated in Central Namibia, the cosmopolitan city of Windhoek serves as the capital of the country. Windhoek has an interesting mix of historical architecture and modern buildings, many of which are worth a look, including the Alte Feste an old fort, the 1896 Christuskirche Christ Church, and the more contemporary Supreme Court. The Olive Exclusive has sleek, modern lines complemented by organic textures, natural furnishings and an eco-friendly philosophy. The suites are individually decorated so that each reflects a different region of Namibia, and each has its own lounge area with fireplace and private dining room.





Wilderness Little Kulala, Sossusvlei - 2 Nights

Sossusvlei is where you will find the iconic red sand dunes of the Namib. The clear blue skies contrast with the giant red dunes to make this one of the most scenic natural wonders of Africa and a photographer's heaven. This awe-inspiring destination is possibly Namibia's premier attraction, with its unique dunes rising to almost 400 metres – making them some of the highest in the world. Wilderness Little Kulala offers luxury desert suites expanded to offer improved airflow, each have a private plunge pool, private rooftop area for sundowners, "African tapas" and other rooftop dinners or stargazing, a signature sleep-out experience on the bottom deck of each accommodation to allow for easy access during the night, luxury fittings, as well as indoor and outdoor showers.



Twyfelfontein is a spectacularly scenic area, featuring one of the largest and most important concentrations of rock art in Africa. The name 'Twyfelfontein' translates to 'Fountain of Doubt', which refers to the perennial spring situated in the impressive Huab Valley flanked by the slopes of a sandstone table mountain. The Huab River Valley lies in one of the best wilderness areas in Namibia, offering endless vistas of plains, valleys and mountains. Wilderness Damaraland Camp is run in partnership with the Torra Conservancy and visits to the local farmstead reveal the fruits of this very positive relationship.

Wilderness Desert Rhino Camp, Palmwag - 3 Nights

Water is scarce in this area, so the river's presence often lures elephants closer to the camps. The reserve is notable for its unusual species of palm tree, the hyphaene petersiana, and for being home to the largest population of southwestern black rhinos in Africa. Wilderness Desert Rhino Camp offers an original, exclusive wilderness experience and the possibility of seeing some of the largest free-ranging population of desert-adapted black rhino in Africa. The desert plains — transformed overnight by summer rains — are starkly scenic, and home to other unique species, from Hartmann's zebra and giraffe, to the bizarre welwitschia plant.














Wilderness Hoanib Skeleton Coast Camp, Hoanib River - 3 Nights

Here Kaokoland meets the Skeleton Coast, in western Namibia, the 270-kilometre-long Hoanib River is one of the last water oases in the country, providing a haven for numerous animals. Home to 75% of Namibia's endemic species, including the largest numbers of desert-adapted, free-roaming elephants, lions, and rhinos in the world, as well as zebra, kudu, and giraffe, this is a truly exceptional and awe-inspiring place. The name "Skeleton Coast" conjures up romantic images of desolate beauty, and proudly remote Wilderness Hoanib Skeleton Coast Camp in the Kaokoveld does not disappoint. The dry bed of the Hoanib River supports a thin green ribbon of vegetation and the wild beaches of the Atlantic coast are within reach, with their noisy seal colonies and eerily quiet shipwreck remnants.



Sharing the southern boundary with Etosha National Park, the prolific 30 000-hectare private Ongava Game Reserve is considered one of the top private game reserves in the region, enjoying global recognition for exceptional conservation, groundbreaking research and exciting safari experiences. The landscape is characterised by vast open plains dotted with salt plans and abundant wildlife. Guests at Anderssons at Ongava have the option of being immersed in and can contribute to developing creative, knowledge driven solutions with resident scientists, visiting researchers, conservationists and rhino security personnel, or simply relaxing and enjoying the luxurious guest suites, waterhole, viewing hide, and pool where they will find their own personal place for reflection.















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
